A well-attended dinner was held on April 15, 2011, at the Washington University School of Law to honor distinguished alumni, including Kenneth J. Rothman. The Distinguished Law Alumnus Awards honor alumni who have obtained distinction in their professional or academic careers. According to Washington University criteria for the award: Those being honored share characteristics of leadership, progressive thinking, high standards, uncompromising integrity, commitment, courage, and confidence.
